From Capri Insurance, your AEF agent.

Q. I sometimes provide riding lessons to others, but I don't get paid for this activity. Am I insured for this?

A. No. If you provide any instruction then you need a separate Coach/Instructor's policy.

Q. I own a horse that I let a friend ride. I don't ask for money and am not paid for this; it is simply a favour. Does this create any problems with the coverage?

A. No, provided your friend is a member of AEF or is an equine professional. If you allow people who are not members or not equine professionals to ride your horse then coverage is void.

Q. I am a member is good standing and compete out of province. Does coverage follow me?

A. Yes. If your principle residence is in Canada, this insurance provides worldwide coverage.

Q. I board my horse. Does my membership insurance cover the owner or manager of the boarding facility?

A. No. They must arrange their own coverage for their commercial boarding operations and all other liability exposure on their premises.

Q. Will this policy cover me for rodeo or racing events?

A. No. This policy does not cover any rough stock rodeo or pari-mutual racing events.

Farm News

Here's our news from Daventry Farms:

We have been eagerly awaiting the news and arrival of...what we thought would be one foal out of the maiden Hanoverian mare named Ajawaan, who was the highest scoring mare in Canada the year she was inspected with the Canadian Warmblood Association, owned by Natalie of Onoway, Alberta, and by our Section B stallion Alvesta Picasso. She was due to foal over two weeks ago and we've been anxiously waiting as she's such a lovely mare. At 355 days and 1 am in the morning, the first filly popped out and then the second. No surprise as Picasso consistently sires fillies...for everyone else except us!! One is chestnut with matching hind socks and large star and the other is a beautiful dark bay sabino (turning grey) with matching hind socklets and ermine spots and full blaze with pink muzzle. Both are doing great and eating well. Less than 1% of mares diagnosed with twins will carry them to term and produce live foals so we are very thankful that mom and fillies are doing so well. We have exciting news to announce, not only for Daventry Farms, but for the Welsh World in general. Three-time WPCSA U.S. National Champion Section D Cob stallion Goldhills Brandysnap is now residing at Daventry Farms. Brandysnap is owned by Goldhills Welsh in Herald, California. It's been extremely hard to keep this quiet for the last couple of months but we wanted to let Brandysnap settle in before we announced he was here!

Brandysnap has won a total of sixteen Supreme Championships, sixteen Reserve Supreme Championships, forty-seven Section C/D Grand Championships and an incredible sixty-nine first place ribbons from a total of seventy-six Section C/D Stallion halter classes. As well, he is the 2007 WPCSA American National Supreme Champion and has won under saddle in both english and western pleasure, driving, ridden cob, trail and hunter.

He will be standing at Daventry Farms while he makes his debut in the dressage ring. We are extremely proud to be standing such a magnificent stallion in Canada and thank the Verkuyl family for entrusting us with their lovely boy! Brandysnap attended his first dressage show on the weekend and was a star! Placing first in his first test and second place in his next test at Training Level. With a top mark of 65.2%, he tied for High Score

of the show. After only three weeks of dressage training, we are thrilled with his progress so far.

May 11th news. We just got home from our dressage show this weekend and Goldhills Brandysnap won everything, with a 67% and 69% at Training Level and won the overall Dressage High Point Award and lots of prizes!!! Lots of people watching him and asking what breed he is...and if we have more. We're very proud of him, considering that he had to show against the Warmbloods and Thoroughbreds. I'm hoping he'll be a nice ambassador for the breed up here for the next few years.

We have one purebred Caspian colt out of Shepton's Tamara that will be sold at weaning as a stallion prospect. We also have a filly and colt by Khamain's Curious Kiwi, a 3/4 Caspian stallion from Missouri out of our warmblood mares. We are delighted at the quality of all of our new arrivals.

Early in the New Year, Marsh Haven Farm was in the press a lot, as we had extensive coverage on our Caspian horses. I apologize for not forwarding the articles to Alberta Welsh Pony and Cob, but somehow the strong division in my mind between the two breeds did not register it would be something other members would enjoy reading about. To be truthful, I have to get the articles back from a friend, so cannot forward them at this time. Texas, our 5-year-old Caspian mare is now home from saddle training. I am looking for a show lease for her, if anyone is interested.

Pajon's Royal Illusion continues to be our star! He has now completed his harness training and is doing fabulously. I wish I could say the same for his whip. My perfectionist personality and self-doubt in my ability comes through as tension in the lines, which of course he take advantage of. We need a few more "get to know each other" sessions with the trainer before I am ready to have him come home. But when I finally remember I know what I'm doing, we have quite a good time.

Talib, the Caspian stallion, will go for harness training after I bring Illusion home. Don't worry, fellow whips, I have recruited 2 young ladies who don't suffer from show nerves to show my boys this summer. In addition to the show season discussed at the AGM, we are planning on taking in the Vermillion Light Horse Show, as it offers several lead line classes, as well as driving classes.

I've also nominated Illusion for the Performance Horse Futurity for Canadian bred 4, 5 & 6 year olds. He will go against the big guys. I didn't see anything in the rules about horses vs. ponies. I also have plans to put him in the Equine Canada Jumper Development Series for 4,5,6 & 7 year olds. Same thing on the rules, although this is supposed to be an introduction for international calibre jumpers. The driving is just to give the pony a job; I knew his real talent lay in jumping when I watched him effortlessly clear a snowdrift the size of a Volkswagen when he got out one day.

This summer, after the Kalispell Show, we plan to carry on to Helena MT for the following Tuesday, where both stallions, a mare and her 3/4 Caspian colt will be presented to American Sport Pony Registry for inspection & licensing. I really want the boys to go through Stallion Performance Tests three years from now.

Life after school teaching is certainly anything but relaxing. With Anivac sales taking off, horses in training, a farm to develop, and mares to breed, life is far from dull.

1. *In Sept.* they meet to discuss the last show to make rule and class changes. From that meeting various drafts are done, for 2008 we have done 13 of them.
2. A judge is suggested, contacted and if they are able to come, a contract is sent.
3. The same with the steward and ringmaster.
4. *In Dec*, - Insurance is paid.
5. Christmas cards to sponsors are sent.
6. Arena deposit is paid for with decisions made as to what will be needed for the show.
7. Ribbons are ordered.
8. Purchasing of trophies commences.
9. *April* - AEF permit is applied for.
10. Steward reviews prize list.
11. Previous sponsors are contacted.
12. Prize list is put on the web site.
13. Posters are printed and put up.
14. Advertising of the show starts.
15. *May* - Prize list is printed and mailed.
16. Accommodation for officials is booked.
17. Flight for judge is booked.
18. Arrangements are made to have someone pick up the judge.
19. Sponsors are sent Thank You cards and listed for the prize list.
20. Ribbons and trophies are sorted and boxed.
21. *June* - A plea for more sponsors is sent out.
22. *July* - Entries start to come in and are checked. Numbers are assigned.
23. Stalls required are asked for, with names of those wanting them.
24. Supper guests are asked to confirm.
25. Program is printed.
26. Vehicles are loaded with things needed for show and taken over the day before.
27. Someone stays at the grounds until 10 p.m. to assist exhibitors.
28. Donuts are ordered for the morning, coffee is ready to be started.
29. 6 a.m. Show day sees committee on grounds.

30. Show office opens. Show commences.
31. Problems are dealt with and solved as best we can for the next two days.
32. After the show, the arena needs to be swept and stalls that weren't cleaned, done.
33. Everything is packed up. Officials are paid.
34. Judge is returned to airport hotel.
35. Next day, accounting is done, things are put away, and ribbon inventory is taken.
36. Show secretary types up results.

AND of course, the committee members are, at the same time, trying to exhibit their own animals.

WHY have we done it for 35 years? Who knows? Maybe because we like to see everyone having a good time enjoying their ponies and fellow exhibitors. When it is all over and you remember the Thank You's received, it seems to make it all worthwhile.
